**NEW INFANT SCHOOL.**—The County Surveyor has laid the proposed plans of the new School before the Managers. The building will be excellent for the purpose—plenty of accommodation, and with every modern improvement in light, heating and ventilation.

The cost will be approximately £1,600; the School, undoubtedly, is needed, and yet it seems a pity that one of the original suggestions of the Managers (1) To use the ground floor of present School; (2) To build on adjoining ground—could not have been adopted. It would have saved the overburdened ratepayer—but this is, of course, ancient history.

**RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.**—The Meeting summoned to discuss the "Bill" was well attended.

The Vicar explained the various clauses of the Bill, and the main reasons why all who value religious education of the children must oppose it. A resolution was unanimously passed condemning the measure. It was decided to have a general Meeting.

A strong Committee was formed, with Mr. H. Loasby as Secretary, for the important work of organizing and explaining the inefficiency and injustice of the Bill.

**CRICKET CLUB.**—The Club has made a very promising start; we were defeated by Corley in our first match—mainly owing to nervousness and dropped "catches," by 33 runs.

But in the match v. Allesley a great victory was achieved, quite an unpleasant surprise to our visitors. Allesley 48. K. & C. 74.
