A prize offered for the best account of the Choir "Outing" was won by A. E. Mascord:—

"The morning of the 9th dawned in anything but promising fashion; hardly had we started from the Schools, when a steady rain came on and some of us regretted having left our rainy outfits at home.

"We arrived at the station in good time, the rain having now ceased.

"After a pleasant journey we reached Euston at 9.30 and immediately adjourned to the Refreshment Hall, most of us being ready to break our fast. After doing justice to the opening repast, we 'boarded' a brake, which had been chartered for us, the driver of which proved himself to be a veritable encyclopædia of London past and present, being able to tell us about everywhere and everybody.

"The day had now turned out beautifully fine and warm, and, in happy spirits, we drove down Holborn, by the 'busiest corner of the world' *en route* for the Tower; here we spent a most interesting time, this being for most of us the first visit. The Armoury, the Regalia, the Beauchamp Tower, and the Traitors' Gate were all seen, and many historical events were vividly recalled to us.

"We then drove to St. Paul's Cathedral, and after a brief inspection of this grand edifice, we wended our way, or rather our driver steered us, through the Strand to Piccadilly, where a good substantial dinner awaited us, which fitted us up for an afternoon's sightseeing. After dinner we drove through Trafalgar Square and visited the Tate Gallery, which contained many beautiful pictures. At the magnificent Westminster Abbey, we stayed a short time for Evensong; after-

wards an inspection of the Wallace Collection which we thoroughly enjoyed.

"We also saw Buckingham Palace, the Houses of Parliament, and many of the town residences of various well-known dukes, lords, etc.

"After a good tea we went by the Albert Hall and Memorial to Earl's Court and spent a most enjoyable evening; we shall not forget for some time to come the sights we saw there.

"Many of us must have dreamt afterwards we were shooting water-chutes and sailing through arctic caves.

"At 11.15 we left Earl's Court, and then travelling by the underground railway, we reached Euston at midnight.

"We had still an hour to wait and did not reach rainy Coventry till after 3 o'clock, but, thanks to the Vicar and Mr. Butters, who arranged a concert and games, we did not feel the lateness of the hour. A little later we were all in London again (via dreamland).—A. E. MASCORD."
