The re-opening Services arranged for  
September 1, were postponed owing to the  
extra work entailed in replacing the floor-  
ing. An 8 o'clock Celebration was held  
in the Chancel; and in the evening the  
Open-air Service on the village common  
was well attended. The presence of the

brass band, and the "Druids" in full  
regalia, created considerable interest in  
the proceedings.

The Church was quite ready on the  
following Sunday, and there were large  
congregations at all the Services. The re-  
novation has effected a great change in  
the appearance of the interior, and has  
been carried out very thoroughly. The  
walls of the nave are done in two shades of  
green, the Chancel in richer colours har-  
monizing with the beautiful tints in the east  
windows. In daylight the whole effect is  
good, but at night when all the bright  
shades of the "glass" are gone, it is  
rather dark, and needs some relief in  
colour. The reading desk, considerably  
reduced in bulk, appears in the Chancel,  
the pulpit has moved into a less conspic-  
uous position; these alterations, opening up  
the Sanctuary, are distinct improvements.

The workmanship throughout could hardly be better.

We are able to say that every one is pleased with the result. On behalf of all members of our Church we would convey to the Churchwardens and Committee our deep appreciation for their painstaking and successful efforts, concluded by a happy coincidence on the 60th anniversary of the Churches' Dedication.

The estimate and other work included To walls and roof,—scrape, mend, replaster defects, two coats of anti-damp treatment, four coats of best lead paint colour and varnish roof timbers.

Alterations in reading desk and pulpit. One extra pew fitted in nave.

Oak seats cleaned and restored, brass work relacquered, flooring north side, replaced, gallery window to open, Doors, vestry, gallery, casements treated.
