Cooking Competition.

The Cooking Competition organised by Keresley War-Economy Sub-Committee proved a great success. The object of the competition was to encourage the intelligent use of meat substitutes as staple foods. Three prizes were offered for the three best original recipes for a meatless dish, and they were judged upon the following points: (1) Food value; (2) cost; (3) flavour; (4) appearance. Sixteen dishes were submitted for the decision of the judge, which office was very kindly undertaken by Mrs. Jagger, assisted by Mrs. Kirby; and, besides the competitors, a fair number of others were present who watched the proceedings with much interest. All the recipes without exception did great credit to the inventors, and to pick out the three best was no doubt a difficult task. The prizes were awarded as follows: 1st Prize (double saucepan), Mrs. J. Craner; 2nd Prize (cruet), Mrs. Dalton; 3rd Prize (given by Mrs. Kirby and Mrs. Cash) (mincer), Miss Olnier. The following are the three successful recipes.

Mrs. Craner's Recipe.

Ingredients.—Potatoes, cheese, macaroni, milk, egg, flour.

Method.—Take $\frac{3}{4}$ -lb of boiled mashed potatoes, and grate half a cupful of cheese into them. Make them into cutlets. Beat one cooking egg, and divide it for sauce and cutlets. Dip cutlets into egg and breadcrumb, and fry in any kind of fat until well brown. For sauce, take a cupful of milk and a tablespoonful of flour, and make a white sauce. Add a heaped tablespoonful of grated cheese and the rest of the beaten egg. Boil macaroni, arrange cutlets round, and serve with sauce.

Sufficient for five persons. Cost, 1s. 3d.

Mrs. Dalton's Recipe.

Ingredients.— $1\frac{1}{2}$ -lbs. potatoes, 1-lb. cabbage, 4-oz. rice, 8-oz. onions, 2-oz. cheese, 4-oz. tomatoes, 1-oz. parsley, 2-oz. margarine.

Method.—Grease a dish with 1-oz. of margarine, and line with half the potatoes. Put a layer of boiled cabbage, and one of boiled rice and onions mixed. Grate the cheese over this, then spread the tomatoes over cheese. Sprinkle parsley over the tomatoes, then cover all with remainder of potatoes, seasoning to taste. Melt the other 1-oz. of margarine in one tablespoonful of hot water, and pour over potatoes. Bake for one hour.

Sufficient for five persons. Cost, 1s. 2d.

Miss Olnier's Recipe.—"Curried Vegetable Pie."

Ingredients.—One carrot, one parsnip, four potatoes, half teaspoonful of rice, one apple, one

onion, half teaspoonful curry powder, half teaspoonful treacle, two tablespoonsful of milk.

Method.—Boil carrot and parsnip until tender; the carrot requires about half longer than the parsnip. The potatoes can be steamed over these. Wash the rice and boil about 20 minutes or half an hour. Fry the onion to a light brown, mix with it the curry powder, then the apple stewed, and the treacle, and about half a teacupful of the water in which the vegetables are boiled. Put alternate layers of rice, carrot, parsnip, and curry until the dish is nearly full. Mash the potatoes with the milk, and spread evenly over the top with a fork, and brown in a hot oven or before the fire.

Cost, about 5d.

The competition is to be repeated on Monday, March 18th, with the difference that this time the object will be the best original recipe for a sweet dish. It will be judged on the same points as before, and any sweetening material may be used. The idea is to produce a good nourishing dish for children. Intending competitors should obtain a numbered ticket from either of the following: Mrs. R. Green, Mrs. Suffolk, Mr. Dalton, by Thursday, March 14th, and the dishes, accompanied by the ticket and written recipe, should be brought to the Parish Room for judging at 3 o'clock on Monday, March 18th. Mrs. Jagger has very generously offered to give the prizes, and Mrs. Kirby to act as judge.

Women's Institute.

Through the energy of Mrs. Miller a branch of the above has been formed in this parish. More than sixty women have joined. Mrs. Miller is President and Hon. Treasurer; Mr. S. Cash Vice-President. A strong Committee (Working—Entertainment—Demonstration) has been formed. Meetings will be held monthly. The first meeting took place on January 24th, when Lady Isabel Margesson gave an interesting and instructive address on "Rabbits and Goats." Miss Flowers, Miss Dalton, and Miss Lloyd entertained us during tea with songs and music.

Demonstrations of hay-box cookery by members also took place.
